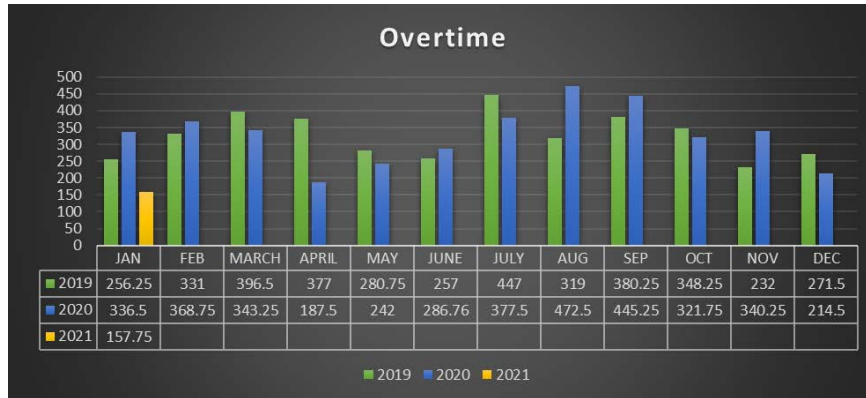
Officers made eleven arrests for OWI in the month of January. Officer Michael Zens began his two year assignment in the Washington County Multijurisdictional Drug Unit. This is a great collaboration with area law enforcement to bring resources to Hartford to combat illicit drugs and the crime that surrounds it.

On January 25, 2021, the City of Hartford Police Department was notified it was the recent recipient of a NextGen 9-1-1 Reimbursement grant awarded to them by the Department of Military Affairs Office of Emergency Communications. Chief MacFarlan discovered the grant opportunity several months ago, and determined it could be used to assist in the replacement of an outdated digital recording system. The digital recording system is used to record phone conversations made on both the administrative and 9-1-1 phone lines in the Emergency Communications Center. Once recorded, the calls can be reviewed by officers as part of an investigation, or used as a screening tool for quality assurance. In addition to that, open records requests can be made, and in most circumstances, a copy of the recording can be obtained. The new system is also compatible with NextGen 9-1-1 and will be able to store pictures, videos, and text messages, sent by callers. The current digital recording system is end of life, and a planned capital improvement project (CIP) is slated for fiscal year 2024 to replace it. The grant awarded to the police department will cover 60% of the project cost with 40% to be paid by the police department. The acceptance of the grant will mean the removal of the project from the CIP, a savings to the tax payer, and an improvement in the technology used to record incoming communications.
